The puppies live in prison with their puppy-raisers from the age of eight weeks to eighteen months. As the puppies mature into well-loved, well-behaved dogs, their raisers learn what it means to contribute to society rather than take from it.

DOG TAGS[®] is a Puppies Behind Bars[®] initiative, launched in 2006, which honors and assists wounded OIF/OEF veterans. By pairing you with a specially trained Labrador or golden retriever service dog, we can help you cope with the challenges of everyday life.

Our dogs, raised in prison, are trained to perform over 80 service dog commands. Since we specialize in dogs for veterans with PTSD and TBI, we also teach our dogs special commands for wounded warriors with these conditions.

All our dogs can open and close doors, turn lights on and off, dial 911 on a phone, carry shopping bags, do laundry, and bring items to you. In addition, we teach them how to find your car in a crowded parking lot; how to look both ways before you enter a room; how to “watch my back”; and how to stop people approaching, if their approach is making you nervous.

Because our dogs are not raised in a kennel, but instead are around people 24 hours a day/seven days a week, they develop an exceptional bond with humans. Raised by prison inmates, they are able to connect with people who may be socially withdrawn.

Dog Tags[®] can only train fifteen of these magnificent dogs per year, but as a result of being a small organization, we offer some of the best service dogs available. We are unique in that we do not send our dogs out to be raised by families, who then return them for formal training; we raise and train them from earliest puppyhood. We've known each dog since he or she was eight weeks old.

Puppies Behind Bars[®] pays for all the costs associated with getting one of these special dogs. We will fly a wounded warrior to one of our training facilities in Colorado or New York, and provide a hotel room, rental car, and food allowance for the two weeks that we train you to become a team with your new dog.

It is the least we can do for you after all you have done for us.

HOW TO APPLY

1. To qualify for a Dog Tags[®] companion, you, an OIF/OEF veteran, must be capable of incorporating a dog into your life. You must be able to provide a stable, safe environment for our dog, as well as love, exercise and food. Most important, you must be willing to become more independent and to work with a highly trained four-legged companion.
2. Access the Dog Tags[®] application online at www.puppiesbehindbars.com (click on "Apply for a Service Dog," then on the "Download the Dog Tags Application" button). Send the completed application and all requested references to our office.
3. After reviewing your application, we will begin the process of interviewing you, speaking with your health care providers, and checking your references.
4. If you are accepted, you will come to New York or Colorado for two weeks of training with the dog we have chosen for you. Six weeks after this training is completed, we will do a home visit, and we will see you annually thereafter, to recertify you and your dog as a working service dog team.
